BOSHAM OPEN MEETING

On Sunday 14th July, Bosham hosted its second Open Meeting for YWDBs. 6 visiting boats, representing all the YWDB fleets in the country, joined 9 home fleet boats in ideal sailing conditions.

The weather was spectacular with a steady 10-12 knot breeze and unbroken sunshine, meaning that T-shirts, shorts, hats and sun cream were very much the order of the day.

Three Olympic style races were run from a committee boat in the main part of Chichester Harbour and each race featured a different winner.



In race 1 Peter Hewitt, crewed by Katharine Hodgson had a comfortable win ahead of David and Fiona MacFarlane from the home club.

In race 2 James Davies and Adam Gray pulled out a significant lead from the rest of the fleet during the second race, with Bob and Kath Davis coming second.

In the last race Colin and Chrissie Blewett just held off Peter Hewitt to secure first place.

The final results were very close with a count back needed to decide 3rd and 4th places.

DAYBOAT WEEK at ROYAL TORBAY YC

For a boat designed 64 years ago it was a testament to its durability and accessibility that 27 boats made the trip to Torquay to take part in what has become more informally known as "Dayboat week". Don't be fooled by the age of the boat (or some of the competitors!) the racing at the sharp end is fierce but after 56 years of Dayboat Week there is more to it than just the racing. Of the 27 boats, none are local to Torbay, with 11 coming from Poole, 6 from Bosham, 6 from Gravesend and 4 other clubs represented.

I had read before I left that the racing in Torbay was of the highest quality unless the wind comes from the East or North East when it gets rather disrupted by the hills and racing needs to be taken further off shore. So for the first day we were disappointed to see a mixed easterly wind creating chaos on the beats as the shifts starting to swing. Many boats found themselves running parallel with others but on different tacks. The fun had just begun. Plenty of opportunity for ground to be won and lost although the experienced heads of Pete Hewitt, Murray Glenister and Richard Cake showing the way to finish in that order.



The Royal Torbay Yacht Club has been in existence for 150 years and sits quietly on a road back from the harbour with great views over the bay, which deceives the eye into the belief that all is calm out there. Certainly not the case on our second day which was to include a commemorative sail past in celebration of the club's history, which unfortunately, together with race 2, had to be postponed. Still, never a chance to get bored at a Dayboat week with plenty of social events to keep the spirits up.

The 2nd and 3rd points races were sailed back to back on a lighter day but no less frustrating. Again the wild swings of wind under the cliffs made the beats a bit of a lottery, but some had better numbers than others. The second race saw

the same two at the top but with brand new boat Icarus sailed by James Davies coming through into 3rd place. Unfortunately for the 3rd race the wind not only decided to swing around by 30 or 40 degrees but to then abandon the race completely. This lead to an almost comical finish with around 20 boats neck and neck creeping towards the line. Having had a strong lead for much of the race, Murray Glenister and Bob Davis were caught in the hole as the pack descended on them. From the chaos emerged some sort of order as Sue Clayton jumped free on a personal gust of wind to take line honours and her first win, a mere 37 years after her first Dayboat week.

Race 4 was another tricky situation with a much steadier breeze (we thought) coming on shore. At the first mark the race was lead by Richard Cake in his 34 year old wooden boat, followed closely by his son David in his 5 year old fibreglass boat (it gets into the blood this boat). The lead changed hands and the wind died leaving everyone bobbing along the waves waiting for any breeze at all. Eventually the fleet drifted across the finish line with Pete Hewitt drifting faster than others to finish first with Geoff Pell 2nd. With just one race left in the points series Pete Hewitt had taken the title as unfortunately Murray Glenister's crew (& wife) Theresa, had not been well enough to compete that day.

The final day saw a much more consistent breeze and the best sailing of the week. Although only 9 boats may agree with that statement as they were the only souls brave enough to venture out to sea. Any suggestion that the older wooden boats aren't up to the task was firmly rejected as Tim Parkinson edged ahead in Avocet (first registered in 1975) to round the windward mark first and keep hold of that lead all the way home. Apparently it was Tim's first championship points race win in 30 consecutive years of attending Dayboat week. Both great achievements. It certainly was not a day to hit a mark but David Cake had a quick turn to do before hitting the plane on the reaches to make up lost ground. When the wind blows these boats can really take it and handle beautifully. In a breeze of around 25 knots, no capsizes and I think, no breakages. They really



are made to last. Who knows, there may be another 56 dayboat weeks to come. There's definitely at least one in Rock, Cornwall next year.

ROCK SAILING AND WATER SKI CLUB

MAY 25 - 29

A new rule was proposed and agreed at the AGM.

Rule 22Electronic Equipment

The use of all electrical or electronic devices or instruments is prohibited except for the following functions: time keeping, compass heading and changes thereof, or the recording of sound or photographic images. Equipment so used shall not receive or use data from any external source.

Are wooden boats finished?

It is a fact that 483 of the 673 DB registered are/were of wooden clinker construction. It is also a fact that once the maintenance of this type of hull is neglected for an appreciable time it requires considerable skill and effort to restore the hull to good condition.

Recently I have had contact with at least two boat builders who have acquired old neglected DB hulls for the purpose of training a new generation of apprentices in the skills required for working on wooden boats. One builder has only the hull and consulted me on acquiring spars, sails, etc. so that he could recover some of the training costs. Thus I've suggested to him that he endeavours to put the refurbished hull, which will be to a high standard, on the market as a spare. After all we replace masts and spars when they are broken or worn out, so why not hulls?



The sailing club is small and very friendly with good facilities. There is a superb south facing balcony for spectators. The moorings dry out but are on a sandy beach. Non sailors can enjoy walking in the area, while Padstow is a ferry ride across the estuary.

Mentoring of DB655 and its crew

When I first came across mentoring at Dayboat Week 2011 in Weymouth, I thought it was a vaguely patronising idea and slightly anti-competitive. The former presupposes that we are fairly useless sailors, which, of course, we are and the latter that a national championship is handicapping the best in favour of the worst by getting the former to give away some of the secrets of their success to the latter.

At Dayboat Week 2012 in Fishguard, a more positive mindset emerged in DB655. We decided to accept the idea of mentoring as being a helpful mechanism towards defeating some of our intrinsic weaknesses in both boat setup and practical racing. At this point, we were hit by a stroke of good luck. In the draw for mentors, we got Murray Glenister, a first class sailor of YW Dayboats. DB655 was always a good downwind boat, but because of set up changes suggested by Murray, she is now a transformed boat going upwind. Back at Bosham having had the suggested changes implemented, we are now much more successful in our series racing. There were many other pieces of advice given by Murray in both setup and practical racing, which don't need detailing here. But suffice it to say, that in my opinion, mentoring encourages a new spirit of optimism in those benefiting from its advice and perhaps defines the compassionate spirit of dayboat racing at the national level.
