Paul and Katie not only competed in every points race throughout the season but also attended their first Dayboat Week at Salcombe.

At Dayboat Week they were joined by 5 other Bosham boats, plus a non sailing, guest appearance from lain and Cass Macpherson!

Whilst the wind gods misbehaved for a large part of the week the sun shone and the Bosham contingent fully enjoyed all that Salcombe had to offer.

A total of 11 boats competed in our Open Meeting. Peter Hewitt and Natalie French (DB 669) battled an increasing wind to win the first two races and were therefore able to sit out the 3rd allowing David and Fiona Macfarlane (DB 597) to secure 2nd overall from Paul Dewing and Katie Prentice (DB 475)

For the third year in a row our main club Regatta was won by Mark Stanton (DB 673) this year crewed by Emma Seaton.

Close racing at Bosham between Barry and Jan Colgate (DB634) and John Webber crewed by Robin Kent (DB600)

Over the year long Club Points series we had an average of 9 boats competing.

For most of the year Alastair and Jacqui Seaton (DB 616) were leading the YWDB's only for a combination of Alastair's dodgy back and a slight problem with the signing on sheet (!) dropping them down the overall reckoning. After a slow start David and Fiona Macfarlane (DB 597) found some significant light weather speed from August onwards to clinch 1st place in the final series race from Paul Dewing and Katie Prentice (DB 475) 2nd with Ian Norman and John Smith (DB 652) in 3rd place.

At the annual Bosham Classic Boat Revival meeting in September there was a total of 60 boats entered with the YWDB's well represented in the Medium

fleet. David and Fiona Macfarlane (DB 597) headed the YWDB's in 5th place overall but were unable to come to terms with two very well sailed Fireflys and a pair of majestic Brightlingsea One Designs.

Looking forward to 2016, we are very confident that there will be a record turnout of at least 9 Bosham boats attending Dayboat Week at Brixham.

The Easter Egg prizes were awarded with Biggar clear winner. However there was a tie for second with second to fourth finishing exactly in reverse order in race 2 from race 1. The Purkis crew were lucky to be awarded 2nd overall, based on their 2nd in the final race.

With 8 crews competing, mostly cadet members, this was one of the best entries in recent years for the early season event.

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RETURN TO BRIXHAM in 2016

We (Kath and I) recently visited Brixham Yacht Club with John and Phil Lokier, and Pete and Sally Hewitt, to finalise (almost!) arrangements for Dayboat Week 2016. As we were about to leave the Commodore, David Faithful, produced a weathered book of old photographs. Many of the Club's records and archives had been lost in a flood, but this book escaped. He turned up this photograph – the 1961 Dayboat Championships.



I only vaguely remembered that the DB fleet had been to Brixham before. Avid readers with a good memory will remember Richard Cake's piece in Dayboat Notes of Dec 2012, part of which is reproduced on page 13. A trawl through the data on the DB website revealed that the Dayboats also visited Brixham for the Championships in 1960, 1961, 1964 and 1967. So we are returning after a gap of 49 years!

The results for these early 'Weeks' are quite illuminating. Turnouts were impressive – 49 boats in 1967, 39 boats in 1964, 37 boats in 1960, although for some reason only 10 in 1961 (no landing craft available? - Ed). In those days the fleet was divided into A and B fleets for clinker and smooth-hulled boats, although not many smooth boats competed (between 2 and 6).



Some members might remember some of the names on the results – Don Tanner, Gordon Anderson and others. Richard Cake (still sailing in Instant Sunshine DB 583, pictured) won the event in 1967 in DB 205, Spartan (and thereby disqualified himself from ever winning the 'Decent' Trophy where age of helm and crew are factoredin with the overall result. Did he think about that at the time?). His brother John (now John Caig) and

late father Eric showed well in the results in 1960 and 1964. I believe that Richard is planning to return to Brixham in 2016 so he will be hoping to repeat the feat 49 years later.

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MEMORIES OF DAYBOAT WEEK 1960 (at Brixham)

From DB Notes December 2012, by Richard Cake

".... at that time very few of us had road trailers. The drill in those days was to ring up Keith Short when your boat was ready after the winter and Keith,

who had a trailer, would turn up with a few club members and take your boat to the club. Simple!

So how to get our boats to Brixham? Well. Bob Newton was commodore of Poole at the time and also as the commanding officer of the Royal Marines at Hamworthy was an honorary member of the club. The solution was obvious: Bob persuaded the marines that what they really needed to do was to carry out an exercise in boat transport by taking a secret cargo (13 Dayboats and the club launch) along the coast to Brixham. Such an easy solution! So at 6am on a foggy August morning, we set sail from our moorings to join the tank landing craft moored in the main channel just



off the club. On arrival (see photo) it transpired that much to our surprise there was a gantry across the stern of the ship, too low for us to negotiate with our masts up, so down they had to come, much more of a performance then than now I can assure you, what with taped up bottle screws and split pins. However, with all safely stowed aboard the ship sailed for Brixham and we all got in our cars the following day to meet her on arrival in Torbay, where the process was reversed."

NEW DAYBOATS

A new Dayboat for James Hewitt (676) has come out of the moulds at Chris Somner's workshop and will be fitted out by the Hewitt 'family'. Its first outing is planned to be to our stand at the RYA Dinghy Show in March.

Unfortunately this may be the last new Dayboat Chris Somner builds. Chris has found that building one Dayboat a year (the current rate), and storing the moulds between builds, is not economic. At Chris's request, the Association has removed the moulds (which are the Association's property) to dry storage in the Poole area. Chris has built 14 grp Dayboat hulls since 2007, and also produced the new deck and hull moulds, and his involvement has provided some much-needed impetus in moving the Class forward after many 'lean years'- only 4 new Dayboats were built between 1997 (when previous builders Porter Brothers temporarily ceased trading) and 2007.

But the situation is that the Association is now seeking a new builder who can produce individual, high-quality boats at reasonable cost. We are progressing some possible candidates, and further suggestions would be welcome. We will keep members updated on progress.

MOULD FUND

Members will recall that the new hull mould was part-funded by loans of £500 each from nine members. Four loans have still to be repaid. The Committee has agreed to repay 2 further loans in January 2016. Although the Association's finances are healthy, we will incur additional expense next year for mould storage and there may be additional unforeseen costs associated with locating a new builder. In recent years members have made generous donations to the Mould Fund with their annual subscriptions, which has enabled the actual membership fee to remain unchanged. The Committee hopes that many members will feel able to continue to supplement the Association's subscription income by making a modest donation when renewing their membership.
